


INTERSCHOOL COMPETITIONS

Independence Day Celebration

15th August 2022, the day marking 75 years of independence from British clutches, was celebrated with great enthusiasm and patriotic fervour by the students and staff at NPS-Koramangala. The celebrations began with the hoisting of the Tiranga by the Principal, Ms. Jyotsna Nair, along with the tunes of the national anthem on the school grounds.


Sanskrit Day






So, You Have Decided to Study Medicine?

National Entrance Examination Test (NEET) - as heavy as the name sounds, so does the pressure that goes with it. As someone who took the entrance test a year back, I can understand the difficulties and anxiousness an aspirant might be going through. Here are some things that might help through your preparation.

Make up your mind

Whenever you tell people that you're planning to do MBBS, their response goes in either two ways, "Wow that's so cool, all the best" or "Are you sure? You have to study forever", and as the examination date gets closer, it's easy to get lost in thoughts and questions about your career choices. I think it is important to remember why you chose the profession in the first place and make up your mind without entertaining conflicting thoughts.

Draw up a realistic timetable

Sometimes we expect ourselves to do so much in a day that when we don't finish those goals, we feel disheartened. Remember that you have only 24 hours in a day and you need a break from time to time. Draw up a realistic timetable that works for you. Remember that everyone's capacity and method of studying is different.

Is NCERT enough?

We all would have heard the phrase “NCERT is your Bible” so many times. But does this work for competitive exams? While it is important to be thorough with NCERT to learn your basics and foundation, I’d suggest you refer to extra material, as questions out of NCERT have been seen in these exams before. But don’t refer to multiple books and confuse yourself. Talk to your teachers and peers and find one/two books that will help you cover all important topics.

Coaching- yes, or no?

Every other person we know is enrolled in some form of coaching these days. I can understand how you might feel if you aren’t enrolled anywhere and feel the need to, simply because you feel left out or less prepared for the exam. So, here’s what I think about it - coaching works as good as the amount of effort you put in and the degree of seriousness you have for your goal.

Coaching can be helpful in the way that it helps you be accountable, as you have weekly tests and teachers looking into your progress. The material they provide is very helpful and detailed. On the flip side coaching also tends to be rushed at times and has the sole purpose of teaching only to crack that one exam. Again, it’s important to understand what might work best for you, and take an informed decision as it forms the core of your preparation.



Importance to all 3 subjects

It can be easy to devote most of your time to the one subject that you like, which at most times tends to be biology. Give adequate time and attention to the other two subjects- chemistry and physics- as well, for it’s very easy to lose marks here. Your score in these two subjects plays a decisive role in your getting a good rank. As the popular saying goes, biology will get you there, but to get a college of your choice, you’ll need physics and chemistry.

Revision, Revision and More Revision

Keep enough time aside to revise all your subjects thoroughly before the exams. As you complete your portions you will find yourself forgetting or confusing the topics you have completed earlier. This is normal and totally fine. Ensure that you have time to revise all the concepts and you are good to go. While self-studying or during class hours, try to make notes that help you revise and remember concepts better.

Time Management and Mock Tests

Mock tests are very important to help identify your grey areas and manage time for the 3-hour exam. Attempt as many mock tests as you can regardless of your preparedness. Use OMR sheets every time and don't forget to time yourself.

After each test, ensure you thoroughly analyse your performance and rectify mistakes before the D Day. Remember that NEET has negative markings. So, it's best to leave the question/s you are extremely unsure of.



On "THE D DAY"

Relax, you have done everything you could. Get adequate amount of sleep the night before, please do not stay up late trying to revise some final topics. It does more harm than good. Have a good breakfast and reach your examination centre well in advance with all the required documents.

Post Result

Congratulations! You have received your results! Whether it is above or below the expected score, do not worry. Be patient while several rounds of document verification and counselling take place. Keep yourself updated with the dates and official notifications. Arrange the required documents that are needed to be obtained by you as per your eligibility, well in advance. Along with counselling from KEA, it is important to note that you may apply for All India counselling via the mcc.nic.in website for Deemed Universities and Government Medical Colleges across India.

Final Note

Remember, it's going to be okay. Don't over-stress or overwork yourself. It is definitely worth it in the end, so stay determined and focused. I hope to see you on the other side. All the best!
