ACHIEVEMENTS

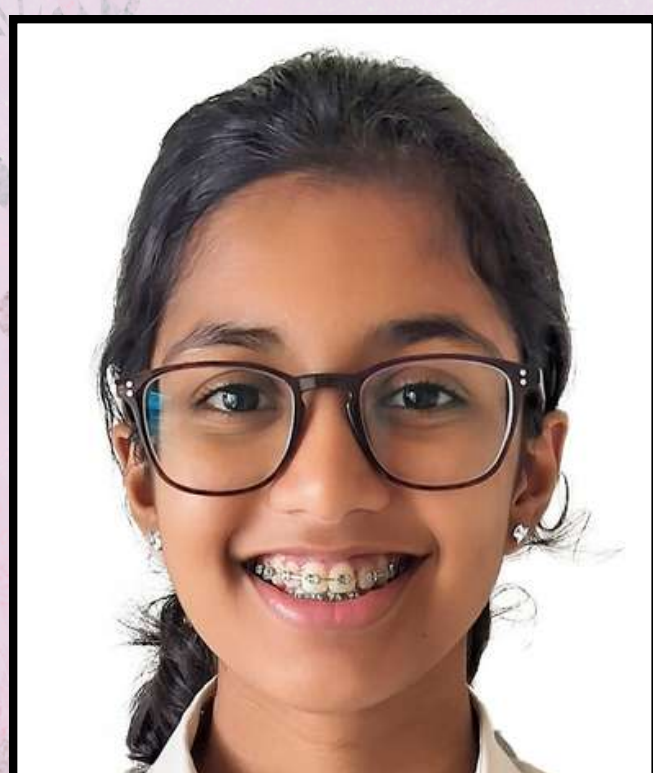

Our Economics student **Akshaj Sharma of Grade 11A** performed extremely well and had made it to the top 5.

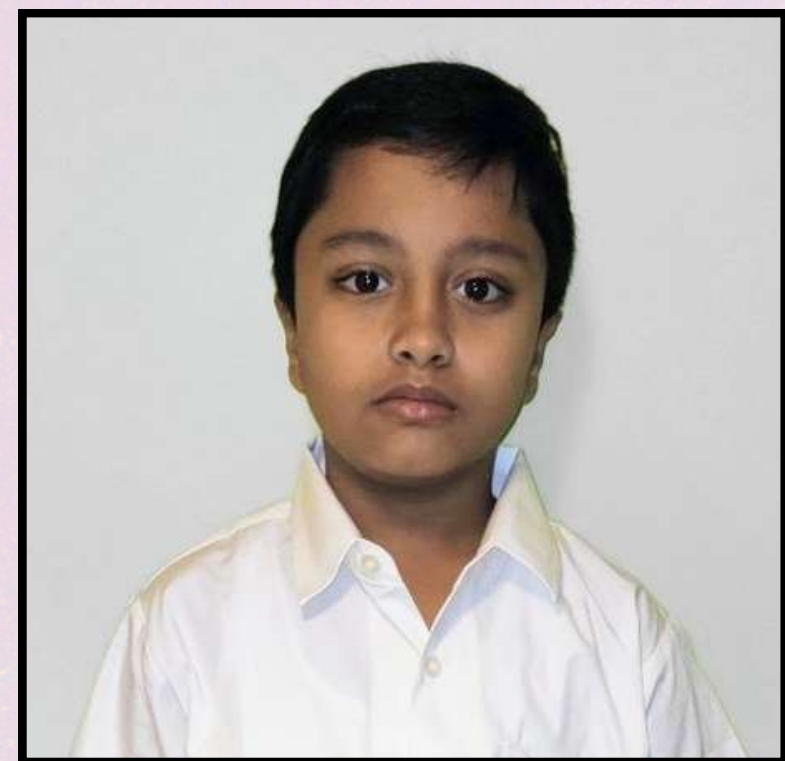

Financial Quiz

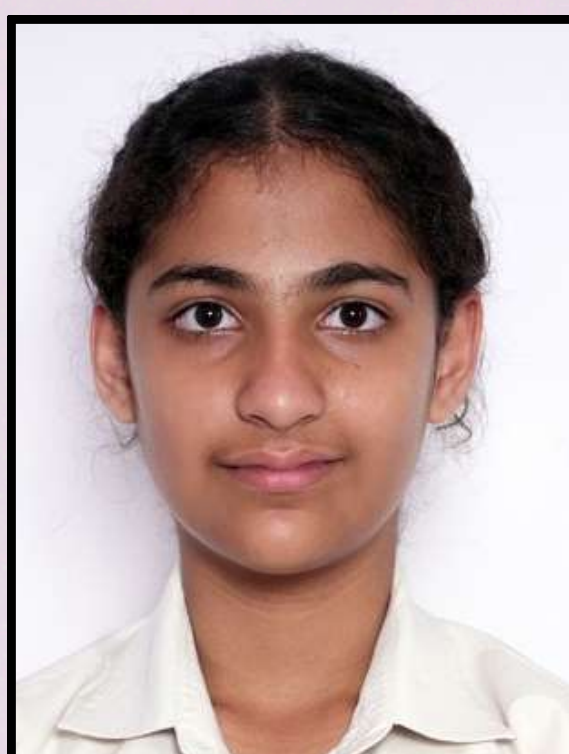

Prakaash Sarran (Grade 11) is an emerging tennis player who has consistently delivered strong performances at both national and international levels.

Prakaash was the finalist in the men's doubles event at the All India Ranking Tournament held in Coimbatore from January 5th to January 11th, where his achievement was featured in the newspaper. The following week, he competed in the ITF J200 international tournament held in Gurgaon. In that event, only two Indian players managed to cross the first round, and Prakaash, ranked around 700 in the junior rankings, defeated a Russian player ranked approximately 171 in the world. This stands as his best victory to date. The result was also reported by Indian Tennis Daily.

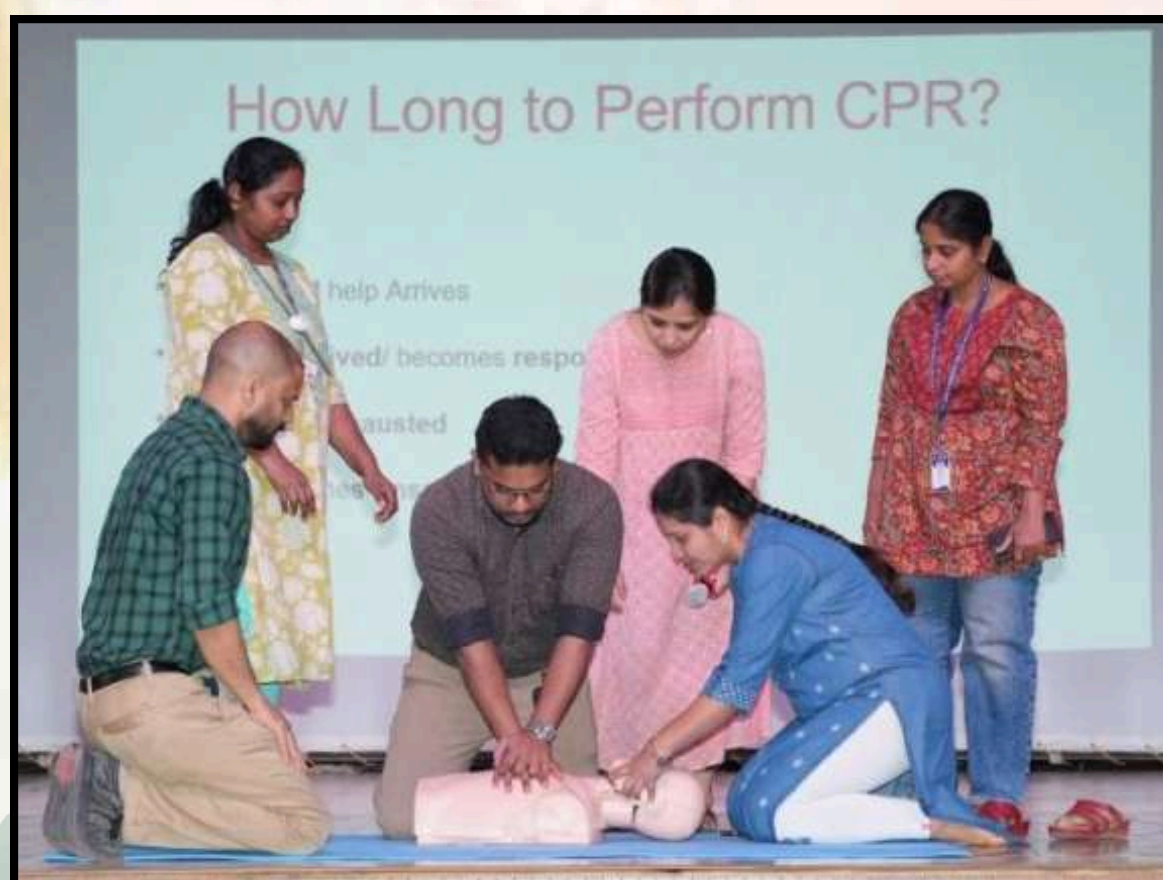

CPR TRAINING PROGRAM

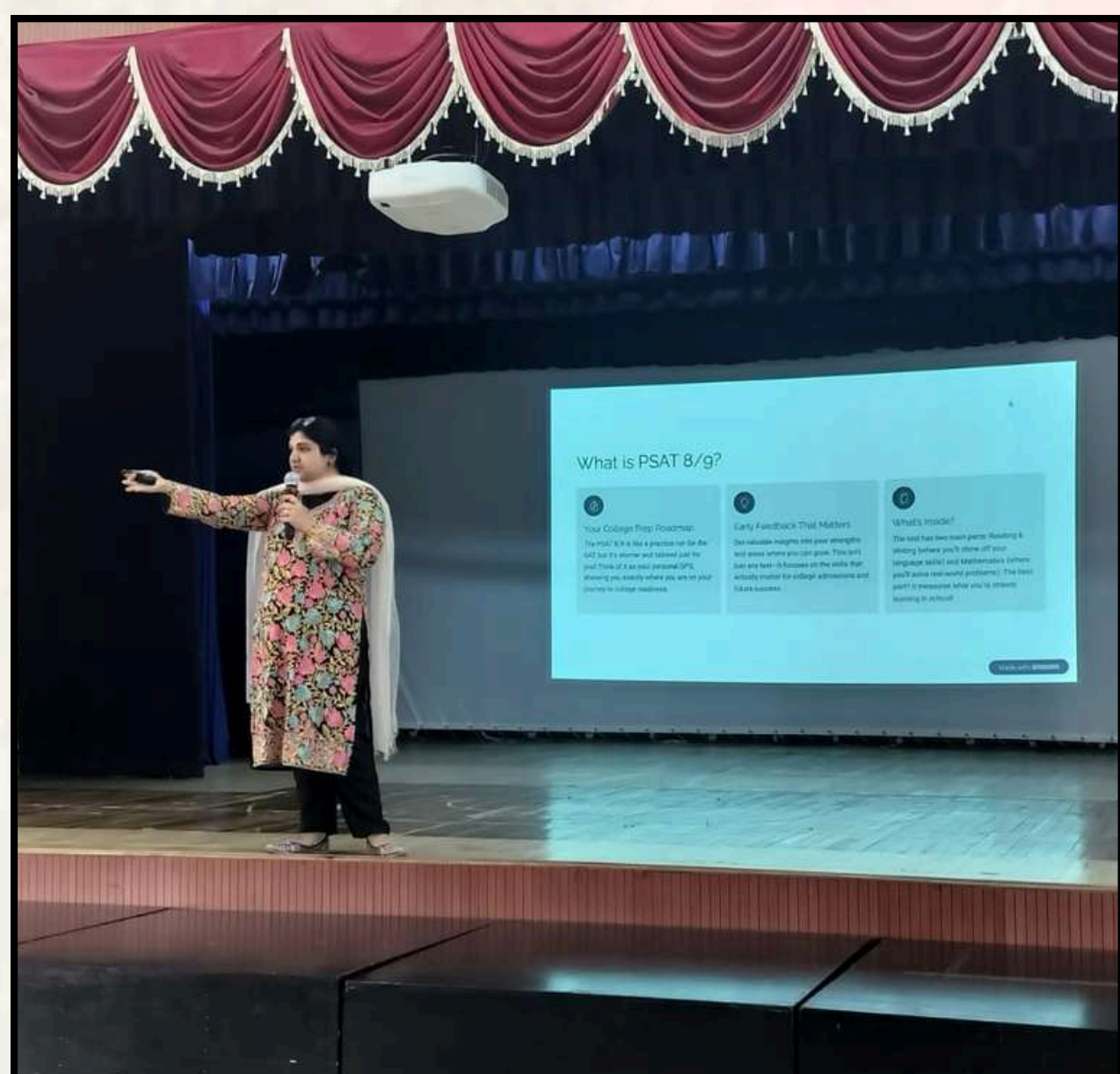
A CPR training session was conducted at the school on 27th January 2026 under The School CPR Program initiated by the Indian Society of Critical Care Medicine (ISCCM). The session was led by Dr. Mahesh Padyana, Consultant in Critical Care at Manipal Hospital and Executive Member, ISCCM Bangalore, along with a team of dedicated doctors and nurses.

Dr. Mahesh delivered an engaging and informative presentation explaining how the heart functions, the difference between a heart attack and cardiac arrest, and the importance of timely CPR. The procedure, precautions, and correct techniques of administering CPR were explained through videos and interactive question-and-answer segments. A short skit by the medical team effectively demonstrated the correct method of performing CPR. Students then received hands-on training in groups using mannequins, making the session practical and impactful. The programme successfully equipped students with essential life-saving skills and confidence.



PSAT PRACTICE TEST INFORMATION SESSION

An introductory briefing on the PSAT Practice Test was conducted in December for students of Grades 8 and 9 by the school career counsellor, Ms. Shivika Gupta. Voices of the World – One Stage, Many Stories

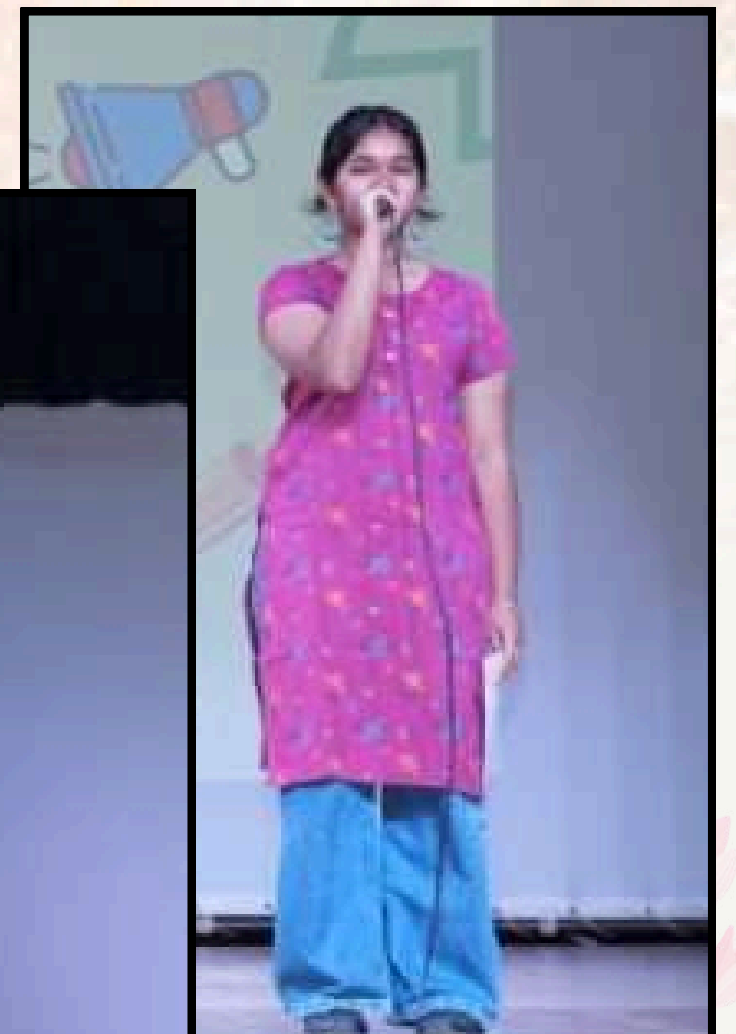
“Language shapes the way we think and determines what we think about” – Benjamin Lee Whorf.

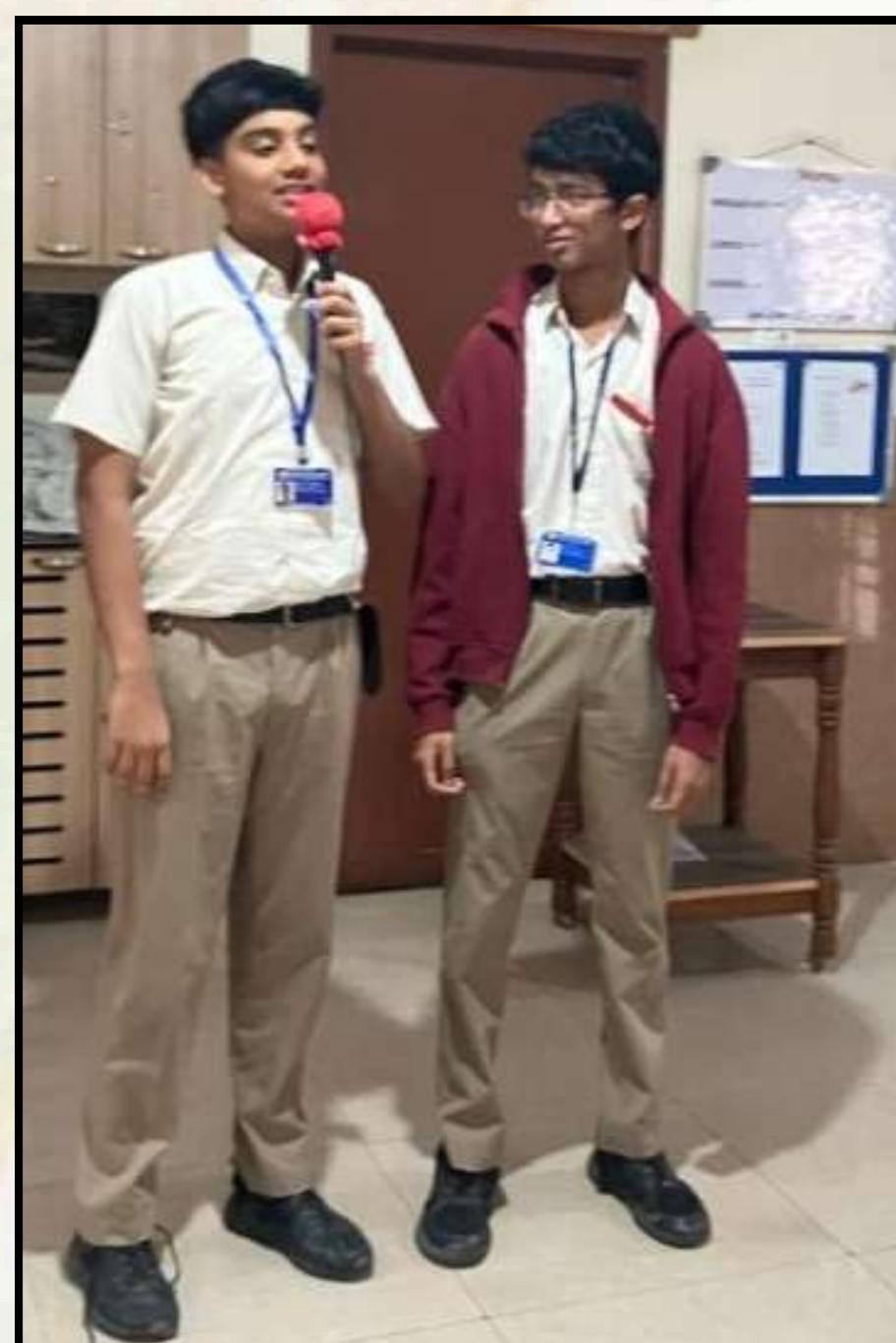


COMMUNITY SERVICE

Dear students,

In the words of – Robert F. Kennedy - "Only those who dare to fail greatly can ever achieve greatly."

Before I begin, I just want you to think about a simple question.

How many times have you ever failed at something?

Now here's another question that follows the first.

How many of you enjoyed failing?

I'm sure you must be thinking that no one enjoys failing.

That's because We've been told failure is bad.

Failing a test? Embarrassing.

Losing a match? Disappointing.

Not getting chosen? Heartbreaking.

And so, we start fearing failure. We hide it. We avoid risks.

But... what if we've misunderstood failure all along?

What if failure wasn't the enemy of success.....but the secret ingredient to it?

Let's flip the word. Let's recondition our thinking.

F-A-I-L = First Attempt In Learning.

- When babies learn to walk, they fall. Then fall again. Then again.
- But we don't call them a failure. We call them brave.
- When you ride a bicycle for the first time, you wobble, maybe crash.
- But eventually, with those failures, you learn balance.

Here are some stories you might know:

Thomas Edison, who invented the lightbulb, was once asked how it felt to fail 10,000 times before getting it right. He said, "I didn't fail 10,000 times. I just found 10,000 ways that didn't work."

What an attitude! Failure didn't stop him. It shaped him.

Michael Jordan's most famous quote about failure is:

"I've failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed."

He also elaborated on this idea by saying,

"I've missed more than 9,000 shots in my career.

I've lost almost 300 games.

Twenty-six times I've been trusted to take the game-winning shot and missed".

He uses these examples to illustrate that failure is an integral part of success, and that one must embrace it to achieve greatness

Want to be great at something?

You have to be willing to be bad at it first.

- The best writers wrote terrible first drafts.
- The greatest athletes lost many games before winning championships.
- The most successful people you admire? Failed. Often. Loudly. Publicly.

What made them different?

They didn't stop. – They used failure as feedback, not as a finish line.

Lets UPEND the meaning of the word Failure. We will tell ourselves – "Failure is not the opposite of success, it is the compost of success." Failure makes us braver, resilient and learners.

So here's my message to you today:

Don't run from failure. Run with it.

Try out for that play, audition for that dance, apply for that scholarship, enter that competition, ask that question, start that project.

Even if you fall flat on your face — fall proudly. Because that fall is teaching you more than comfort ever could.

In fact, I'll leave you with this:

• The real failure... is never trying.

The real failure... is never growing.

The real failure... is fearing failure itself.

So next time you stumble, smile. Get up. Dust off.

And say, "I just took my first step toward something great." – Thank you.
